Greetings delegates, guests and international delegates! Welcome to the 32nd National Convention of the Communist Party USA!

After months of pre-convention discussion in our clubs, online at CPUSA.org, and at state and district conventions, we finally come together here in Chicago—the birthplace of May Day, of our party, and of People's World, founded 100 years ago as the Daily Worker.

We meet at a pivotal moment in history. The danger from Trump's MAGA right and fascism looms. A genocidal war rages in Gaza. Racist, misogynistic, and anti-LGBTQ attacks on our working class continue. And the ruling capitalist class continues its offensive, pushing an agenda of tax cuts for the rich and inflation and budget cuts for the rest of us.

But as Communists, we know all too well that the people's movements everywhere are fighting back. Working-class and small-d democratic forces are uniting to block the extreme right up and down the ballot. The demand for a ceasefire has swept the country, with millions now demanding peace and the right of Palestine to its own state.

Women, Black Americans, Latinos, Asian Americans, immigrants, Native Americans, LGBTQ people, youth, and the other forces for progress are engaged in struggles all along the line. And workers — organized and unorganized — are rising up with a militancy not seen in decades.

As delegates to this convention—the highest decision-making body of the Communist Party—you have important responsibilities. Over the next three days, we will collectively deliberate on the report of the outgoing National Committee, hear from various commissions and bodies, consider resolutions, and elect a new national leadership.

But we will also have a lot of fun along the way, with entertaining cultural performances, comradeship shared over meals and discussions, engaging exhibits from International Publishers and others, and a big birthday party for People's World.

Finally, we recognize the work of the Convention Organizing Committee and its 18 subcommittees — especially the Agenda, Culture and Décor, and Housing and Registration Sub-committees, which carried the heaviest loads. To all those who volunteered their time and effort, we say thank you. Without your dedication, this convention would not have been possible.

Now comrades, let's get down to work and move forward together!



To refuse to sacrifice any of us for some.


You draw from your stone,


